From the Chair

The College is, to paraphrase a description from the corporate sector, relentlessly pursuing excellence. We have enhanced our funding of organizations that provide pro bono legal services to indigent consumer debtors; educated our Fellows, other professionals and law students; and helped to maintain the insolvency community's legacy. A quick sampling of our recent accomplishments follows.

Pro Bono

The College devotes more than half of its operating budget to funding pro bono bankruptcy-related services. This past year, our pro bono committee received 38 grant applications from legal service and other similar organizations requesting grants in the total amount of \$379,847. These requests sought funds for critical bankruptcy and debtor-creditor services to low-income debtors provided through clinics, workshops, training, bankruptcy software programs, written materials and videos.

The College provides 70% of all funds distributed by the committee. The College's Foundation, which oversees the committee's work, provides the remaining 30%. In the last calendar year, the pro bono committee was able to make grants totaling \$320,000 to 36 programs in 21 states.

To supplement the funds donated by Fellows, the Foundation has begun participating in Amazon.com's charitable giving program, Amazon.smile. Through this initiative, Amazon will donate one-half of one percent of all purchases made through a dedicated link (detailed on the College's website). The Foundation continues to search for additional sources of revenue to fund pro bono activities, having created a development task force to raise legacy gifts, creditor trust and unclaimed plan distributions.

Education

During the past year, more than 100 Fellows participated in the activities of the College's Education Committee. It has organized diverse programs on bankruptcy topics throughout the country. Among the programs administered by the committee was a law student negotiation bankruptcy competition among 11 law schools, which was hosted by Ninth Circuit at the University of Southern California. In the Second Circuit, on October 27, 2015, former and current bankruptcy judges spoke to Fellows about their judicial experience, comparing it to their work legal as practitioners. In February, 2015, the Fourth Circuit held a program Washington in evaluating the recent American Bankruptcy Institute Report on Chapter 11. Other Circuits have also scheduled symposia, seminars and social events on bankruptcy-related topics over the next few months.

The College also initiated a joint program with Bloomberg in New York on October 23, 2015, discussing recent Supreme Court decisions and other cases likely to be heard within the next term. Four of the five panelists were Fellows.

The International Committee has continued to provide an international insolvency class for 12 U.S. law schools. The course is led by Fellow Ray Warner of St. John's University

School of Law. Faculty for this international insolvency course is made up of College Fellows who include professors, judges and practitioners. The College is currently arranging for the inclusion of Canadian and Mexican law schools in this course. The committee also conducted a program with international Fellows on September 29, 2015 at the National Conference Bankruptcy Judges' annual meeting.

Fellows from all Circuits are currently engaged in updating the College's excellent Circuit Review series. Publication of the updated edition is expected in 2016.

Legacy

College's The Archives Committee currently has 73 oral histories from leading scholars, judges and practitioners. It has also undertaken а digitization project for papers it has received from those Fellows responsible for drafting the 1978 Bankruptcy Code and subsequent amending legislation. These papers deal with consumer bankruptcy law, international bankruptcy law and papers from the 1996-97 Bankruptcy Review Commission.

The College entered into an agreement with Bloomberg Law this past year that covers roughly half of the operating expenses of the College's Archives at the University of Pennsylvania School of Law. The National Conference of Bankruptcy Judges also

provides another \$5,000 of funds for maintaining the Archives.

New Senior Fellow Committee

The College's board approved directors the formation of a Senior Fellow Committee to keep senior professionals engaged in the work of the College. Because 70% of all Fellows are now at least 60 years old, contemplate substantial participation from these senior Fellows in providing pro bono financial and legal services; conducting educational events; and mentoring younger Fellows.

Strategic Planning

The College has already implemented a number of the Strategic Planning Committee's March, 2015 recommendations on governance and admission of new Fellows. On September 28, 2015, many of the College's Officers, Directors and Regents met with the Committee for half a day to discuss the committee's recent survey of all Fellows regarding financial, international and branding issues. We intend to report the committee's soon on recommendations.

Foundation Report: Year-End Circuit Campaigns in Full Swing

So I usually like to begin the Foundation Column at this time of year by reporting on our Fall Board meeting, and

on the Foundation presentation at the All Fellows Luncheon held this year in Miami Beach. And I usually like to write about how through the generous support of our Fellows and the efforts of the Pro Bono Committee we made so many grants to so many deserving organizations and projects in so many states (and, of course, the District of Columbia). facing the fact that this is my last column of 2015 and that, as the headline states above, Circuit campaigns indeed are (or should be) in full swing, let me get right to the point: We need your support in 2015 as in the past, and we need it now.

Counter-intuitive as it may be for an insolvency lawyer who occasionally represents debtors, let me start by giving you The Good News first: We are off to a great start in our year-end campaign -- as of November 12, 2015 we have raised just over \$120,000 toward our 2015 target of \$254,500. the total to date includes several extraordinary gifts there is every reason to believe that we will exceed our goal again as we did last year.

But now, The Reality: So far only 272 of our 847 Fellows have contributed, less than one-third. The one-time, nonrecurring gifts take us only so far, and by definition cannot be relied upon from year-to-year. The only way the Foundation can continue to fund the great number of financial grants to pro bono legal services across the country is for each and every one of our Fellows to make it a habit - a priority -- to support our efforts every single year.

And finally, The Challenge: In 2014 we had an overall participation of 64%, and for 2015 we have adjusted the projected rate upward to 72%. We are barely halfway to last year's participation rate, and far short of this year's goal. So "more as some of the seasoned" Fellows will remember from the movie Smokey and the Bandit, we still have "a long way to go and a short time to get there!"

By now each of you should have received any number of solicitations from your Circuit Campaign Committees to make your annual 2015 donations. And this year, our new College website makes it easier than ever to donate. Just go to the site at www.amercol.org, and even without logging in to the Fellows-only area you will see half-way down in the left-hand

column an orange field with the Foundation logo. Just click on that field and a PayPal page will appear, from which you can make your donation by credit card -- quickly, painlessly and, we hope, generously! For those of you who prefer to donate by check, a click on the red "click here" link immediately below the logo will pull up a PDF form that you can print out, fill in and mail in with your check.

It's a fact of life that charitable organizations solicit heavily in the last weeks of each year, and the Foundation is no different. Unlike other organizations our request is fairly modest: no amount is too small, and for active practitioners we suggest a contribution equal to one billable hour of your valuable time.

Those of you who attended our Fall Fellows Luncheon in Miami Beach got to hear firsthand from Put Something Back, the program sponsored by Dade Legal Aid in Miami-Dade County and for many years a grant recipient from Foundation. Even more movingly, you got to hear from a 77 year-old client helped by that program to discharge her debts after she lost her life savings to a Ponzi scheme and had nowhere else to turn for help. Until that day I'd never heard anyone say, College American Bankruptcy Foundation saved my life!" And I have never been prouder to be a Fellow of the College than I was that afternoon.

As we count our many blessings this holiday season,

please take a moment to remember the good work of the Foundation and its positive impact on the lives of so many who might otherwise lack access to the resources they need to regain their financial footing.

Wishing you all a happy and healthy holiday and a joyous and prosperous new year.

The all-day Board of Regents meeting in Miami on September 2 7 t h produced 31 invitations

for induction into College Class 27 to candidates from Canada, Greece and 19 states. Invitees include two bankruptcy judges, 24 attorneys, three financial advisors, a law professor and a bankruptcy court clerk. They range in age from 42 to 68; ten of the 31 are women (32%). This is another excellent group of bankruptcy professionals who no doubt will make outstanding additions to the College. Spring 2016 International Bankruptcy Course

Seven U.S. law schools and one Mexican law school will participate in the 2016 session of the

College's renowned International Bankruptcy course. The course is one of the College's major contributions to the education of bankruptcy law students. The College sponsors guest lecturers from the U.S. and around the world to teach law students about the insolvency systems of major countries and how cross-border cases can be coordinated using the European Union Insolvency Regulation and U.S. Chapter 15. The schools hold simultaneous classes using an internet bridge provided by the University of Utah's S. J. Ouinney College of Law, where former College President and Chair Prof. Ralph R. Mabey is one of the course professors.

The course has been revamped to include more Fellows as lecturers and to reflect the rapidly changing nature of cross-border insolvency practice. Prof. G. Ray Warner, of St. Johns University School of Law, was appointed to lead the course and a new College committee, headed by Judge Charles G. Case II (D. Ariz.) (Ret.), supervises the course and helps recruit new law schools to participate.

The Faculty for this year's lectures are: Hon. Timothy A. Barnes (N.D. Ill.), Agustin Berdeja-Prieto (Mexico), Prof. Susan Block-Lieb (Fordham), Prof. Charles D. Booth (Hawai'i), Hon. Charles G. Case II (D. Ariz.) (Ret.), Hon. Shelley C. Chapman (S.D.N.Y.), Zack Clement (Fulbright & Jaworski) (Ret.), Hon. Robert D. Drain (S.D.N.Y.), Daniel M. Glosband (Goodwin Proctor), Hon. Allan L. Gropper (S.D.N.Y.) (Ret.), Sean Hagen (IMF), Alexander Klauser (Austria), Prof. Ralph R. Mabey (Utah), Justice Geoffrey B. Morawetz (Canada), Prof. Michael Veder (The Netherlands), Prof. Adrian J. Walters (Chicago-Kent), and Justice Maria Cristina Zucchi (Brazil).

Pro Bono Committee Awards Grants

The College and the Foundation continue to be the largest supporters of bankruptcy pro

bono programs in the country. The Pro Bono Committee this year selected 34 programs to receive grants of up to \$10,000 each for a total of awards of \$320,337, received by those grantees by the end of October. The grantees are in all parts of the country. Over the years all circuits have been the beneficiaries of these grants. service of Another the Committee and College staff is to make available the training materials and best practices of those programs on our website.

The Committee is committee of the Foundation. but its funds come from both the College and the Foundation. Nearly all funds raised by the Foundationmeaning from us personallyare devoted to these grants. As members of the College we contribute several ways: by by contributing money, strengthening the network of these programs through our website, and by our personal pro bono services provided through our local programs.

Twelve new members were added to the Committee this year and brought with them a

wealth of knowledge and special expertise to share with the other members. Four members served as special advisors or in another special capacity. The thirty-six regular members of the committee made the policy decisions and plans for the year, prepared written evaluations of each of the thirty-eight applications, made oral presentations, and participated actively in the six conference call meetings and one in-person meeting at the NCBJ to select the grantees. The Committee members from all of the circuits.

Despite the fact that we have sufficient numbers of grants for the funds we have available the Committee especially wishes to help start new programs or to assist programs new to us. So one takeaway is that we encourage College Fellows to lead on the development of new programs to provide bankruptcy pro bono services in your own communities, working with the local bankruptcy judges, bankruptcy bar associations and law schools. Or encourage existing programs in your area to apply for one of our grants. The deadline for next year is likely to be July 1, 2016.

The other takeaway is to give generously to our Foundation. A related idea is to direct to our Foundation cy pres type funds, such as undistributed chapter 11 plan dividends, foundations that would like to make bankruptcy pro bono one of the objects of their charity. Those dollars will help strengthen our bankruptcy systems and assist people who really need representation and won't get it without our help.


Dear Mr. Baillie,
